Write a sentence of 25 words or fewer that clearly and boldly states the theme of this novel. Then, describe three specific elements from the text that support your idea.	Imagine you are an editor assigned to give this text a new title. What title would you create? Write an explanation that would convince your boss that your title is the right one for this story/chapter.
In the voice of the narrator, write a diary entry from the day after the last event of this novel occurred.	What is one choice a character made in this novel that you would change?
